- 3 Divide the book into (no more than eight) sections, and give each section a short sentence title that describes the contents.
- 4 What has struck you as the two or three main recurring themes? Trace each theme through the book by jotting down some references.
- 5 Can you spot any patterns in the way that the chapters are put together? Why do you think the book is put together like this?


