## THE QUESTION: DOES GOD NEED TO JUSTIFY HIMSELF TO JOB?

Elihu's answer (32:1–37:24)

• Is your view of God big enough?

God's answer:

- No, because Job doesn't have the vantage point to accuse God (38:1–40:2)
- No, because Job doesn't have the strength to challenge God (40:6–41:34)

Job's right response (42:1–6):

"I have uttered what I did not understand, things too wonderful for me, which I did not know" (v3)
