
1 Thessalonians



Hearing and responding to God's word

This term we will study 1 Thessalonians together at the Partnership. Our aim is not to accumulate academic knowledge but rather to be established in our faith (1 Thess 3:2), to stand fast in the Lord (1 Thess 3:8) and to be kept blameless at the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ (1 Thess 5:23). To help us do this we are going to study the same passage over 2 weeks so we have good time to work together at both **hearing** rightly what God is saying to us and **responding** rightly to it.

Paul expects change to take place in the lives of the Thessalonians as the gospel is taught (cf 1 Thess 4:1–2). However, in our desire to rightly respond God's word we can often try to shortcut the process and end up applying either minor points from the passage or even something completely wrong! Our aim is to "encourage one another and build one another up" (1 Thess 5:11) and to be "taught by God" (1 Thess 4:9) as we allow the word of God be at work in us as believers (cf 1 Thess 3:13). We have tried to show what this looks like in practice in the diagram and explanation below.



PASSAGE: EXPECT TO HEAR GOD SPEAK

Biblical 'application' starts by understanding what God is saying. We need to listen carefully to God's voice and to do this we take great care in studying God's written word together. We are not here to share opinions on the passage or our own 'interpretations', rather we are seeking to hear God's voice clearly and authoritatively.

Studying the Bible like this takes time so we encourage everyone to spend at least one hour before each study reading the passage and using the prep questions (or Toolkit – see back of booklet) to kick start this thinking process. And because this is a spiritual exercise we must pray for God's help as we do this.

PURPOSE: IDENTIFY THE PURPOSE

The next step in hearing and responding is to try and grasp God's 'purpose' in giving us this bit of Scripture. To do this we first need to see why the author, inspired by God, included this passage and what was their intended purpose for the original readers. We often call this the 'author's purpose'. Having prayerfully thought about 'what' the passage is saying, its 'meaning' and 'context' we then need to ask why the original readers needed to hear this. It's important we do this carefully so we rightly hear what God is saying to us today. If we jump straight to 'us' the danger is we lose the real impact of what God is saying. The process is illustrated in the diagram. After this we carefully think how we are in similar (or contrasting) circumstances to the original readers. Then we will start to see the relevance of 'the purpose' for us today. Working like this forces

us to slow down in our 'application' and thus see more clearly what are primary and what are secondary 'applications'. Furthermore, as we work in the same direction as the author's purpose we will see richer and more meaningful applications.

APPLICATION: THE PURPOSE CHANGING OUR 'HEART-MIND'

The engine of Christian growth is God's word changing and re-shaping our belief system/our world-view/our 'hearts and minds'. (See Ephesians 4.19–24; Philippians 2.5; James 5.8; Romans 8.5–6, etc). As we repent and believe God's word, he changes us at the core of our being, the control-centre of our lives. In this booklet we refer to this as 'heart-mind' change. God does it but he does it as we pray and obediently bring our outlook, our ambitions, etc in line with his.

When considering 'application' of a passage it is easy to jump straight to considering changes in our external actions. But usually the purpose of the passage will be much bigger than that—it will change how we see God, his work, the world, etc. It is important that we pause, pray and think hard about how the purpose changes our heart-minds. This change will then work itself out in all kinds of 'implications.

With just one big 'heart-mind' change there could be countless implications.


For example, as we come to realise that "Jesus Christ is Lord" there are no immediate actions for us to take, however once we grasp this at a 'heart-mind' level we realise it fundamentally changes the way we view the world. To help we can use diagnostic questions like the following to process this truth: how does this compare to what we believe? Why do we find this so hard to believe/ love? What in our lives shows we don't believe this? How does this help me understand the world around me? What might change in my convictions/actions if I really believed this?

1. Implications: working out the change in practice

The last step is allowing the big 'heart-mind' change(s) to spin out into 'implications'. As you can see in the main diagram the multiple arrows coming out of the 'heart-mind' change show there are countless ways in which God's purpose impacts the way we pray, think and act. Once we reach this stage we should have prayerfully heard God speak clearly, done some serious thinking on how 'the purpose' changes us deeply, and as a result these implications will flow naturally from the passage.

The diagram below shows how as we circle around the big application applying it deeply to our 'heart-minds' we will inevitably spin out into 'implications'. We need to realise that many specific implications or practicalities may look very different for different people. This is why working together at Partnership can be a great way to build one another up.

To continue the example above understanding deeply that "Jesus Christ is Lord" at a 'heart-mind' level should change the way we view our lives. We are not living now to "get what we can" rather we are living for the Lord Jesus. This big heart-mind change might for one person make them more confident to pray and for another might bring deep comfort in the face of ridicule and for still another might make them more urgent in evangelism.




2. Prayer

This final step isn't really a step, it is a constant reminder that at every point we need to pray and ask for God's help. We need to pray as we study the passage, think of the purpose, meditate on the application and live out the implications. This year let's "pray without ceasing" (1 Thess 5:17) asking God to teach us (cf 1 Thess 4:9) as His Gospel is proclaimed (1 Thess 2:9).

3. Format

We'll focus on understanding the passage in the first week and then in the second week focus on responding to the passage and prayer. Hopefully this format will give us more time to help each other consider the application and implications of what God is saying to us and more time to pray in response and more time to pray for each other's workplace mission fields. The new format is really just a way for us to give more time to all that we normally do in Bible study. Experience shows that we often squeeze application and prayer into a rushed two minutes at the end of a study. Please don't be worried about the change but please do come expecting to be changed by God this year. The structure of the studies and prep is outlined in the diagram below. We have arranged it in such a way that even if you don't make it every week you will still be able to benefit hugely. So please come as often as you can and don't panic if you miss study A.



Study 1A: 1 Thessalonians 1:1-2:12

Appendix: a basic Bible study toolkit

[Recommended reading: Dig Deeper, Nigel Beynon and Andrew Sach (IVP, 2005)]

The 'tools' are ways of helping us understand the Bible for ourselves. Each tool helps us slow down and pay careful attention to what God is saying in his word. We are not trying to apply a formula to hearing God speak but we are seeking to listen carefully to what he has to say through his written word.

The **Structure tool** is often the best place to start— 'how does this break into sections?' Then look at various details of the passage using other tools, but always heading for the same end goal. What is the overall point? (**Author's purpose tool**), how does it fit with the flow of argument in 1 Thessalonians (**Context tool**) and what will it mean for my life? (**So what? tool**). Even if we don't explicitly mention these four tools in the prep questions, you should use them! (We need to grasp firm conclusions about what God is saying to us!)

	Author's purpose tool	Dig Deeper!, chapter 2. The biggest question we can ever ask of a passage in the Bible is simply: why did the author write this?
	Context tool	Dig Deeper!, chapter 3. Words come within sentences, sentences in paragraphs, paragraphs in chapters, chapters in sections Rip something out of context and you'll miss what God is saying.
The last section of the la	Structure tool	Dig Deeper!, chapter 4. How has the author broken down his material into sections? How do these sections fit together?
	'So what?' tool	Dig Deeper!, chapter 17. What difference does this make to my life? How will it work out in particular situations I am facing at the moment?

Here's a quick recap of the rest of the toolkit:

Linking words tool	Dig Deeper!, chapter 5. Whenever you see a 'therefore' ask what it's there for! And the same goes for words like 'because', 'so that', 'for' etc.
Parallels tool	Dig Deeper!, chapter 6. Look out for when it says the same thing twice in different words. That gives you two chances to understand what the author is saying.

		Dig Deeper!, chapter 7.
	Narrator's comment tool	Sometimes the author breaks into his narrative to explain what's going on (a kind of "pssst, reader, make sure you understand this")
	Vocabulary tool	Dig Deeper!, chapter 8. Mostly you can find what words mean by looking them up in a dictionary. But be alert in case the author is using a familiar word in a special or unusual way.
	Translations tool	Dig Deeper!, chapter 9. Check passages across different translations. If there are important differences, try to find out more!
	Tone and feel tool	Dig Deeper!, chapter 10. As we come to the Bible, we should not only pay attention to the point that is being made, but also how it is being made. What feelings does the passage evoke?
	Repetition tool	Dig Deeper!, chapter 11. Sometimes the author says something more than once to make sure we don't miss it. Sometimes the author says something more than once to make sure we don't miss it. Look for repetition.
	Quotation/allusion tool	Dig Deeper!, chapter 12. When the author quotes or alludes to another part of the Bible, we should look up the original context of his quotation. What connection is being made?
	Genre tool	Dig Deeper!, chapter 13. There are many types of genre in the Bible—songs, prophecies, proverbs, laments, visions, speeches, parables, historical narrative. Identifying the genre is very important to how we interpret a passage.
La Ba	Copycat tool	Dig Deeper!, chapter 14. Is the author being prescriptive or merely descriptive? Is he holding up a pattern of life to imitate or avoid?
A.	The 'Who am I?' tool	Dig Deeper!, chapter 16. With which character (if any) does the author intend us to identify ourselves?
